David Elliott, PC'64, Palm City, FL – Television Network Director/Engineer. ABC Vice President, recipient of several EMMY awards and Assistant National Commodore of the US Coast Guard Auxiliary...

Narda Simonsen Murphy, PC'64, Williamston, MI – Teacher/Superintendent and Grant Writer. Directly and indirectly impacts over 1,000 students annually and has written, obtained and netted over 1.0M in grant monies for her school district...

The Parsons College Foundation Fund (PCFF), in conjunction with the Parsons College Alumni Association (PCAA), has announced plans for a Parsons College Student/Alumni All-Class Reunion to be held in Fairfield, IA, October 4-6, 2013. The Wall of Honor ceremony will highlight a three-day weekend of events. Tickets for all of the weekend activities (Friday night, Saturday lunch and Saturday night will be available upon registration for \$75.00).

Student/alumni registration opens at 3:00 p.m. Friday at the Fairfield Country Club (909 East Harrison), followed by a "Welcome Back to Fairfield" reception with beer, wine and heavy hors d'oeuvres. Other activities going on in Fairfield, and around the town square include, "1st Friday Art Walk" and the kickoff of Oktoberfest, complete with beer, German food and a polka band.

Severe Blow To Fairfield.... **'Insurmountable Odds' Close Parsons Doors**

(Editor's note: Those were the bold headlines appearing on the front page of the June 1, 1973 edition of the Fairfield Ledger. It was the sad news expected by many but not easily accepted by most. A number of the key happenings over the previous 98 days are listed below. This information was researched and obtained from the archives of the Fairfield Ledger...

February 24 – A cutback of 15 faculty members, effective at the start of the 1973-74 academic year, was announced. Simultaneously, a proposed Gerontological Center was introduced as part of the Parsons "Project 100" program.

March 12 – The resignation of Carl W. Kreisler as president and the appointment of Everett E. Hadley as acting president was announced by Roger Lund, board chairman.

April 26 – Unable to meet payroll, the college announced that faculty members making \$600 or more per month would received only half pay for April. Hourly employees were placed on ½ time schedules starting May 1.

May 5 – Professor Kranin, modern languages, filed a complaint with the Iowa Attorney General Claiming the dropping of 15 faculty members violated the college's articles of incorporation.

May 8 - A "Phase II" study of the Gerontological Center was suspended by action taken by the lenders committee.

May 10 – It was disclosed Carl Kreisler drew his salary as president of Parsons while serving as a member of the Western Kentucky U. faculty between December, 1972 and March, 1973.

May 17 – The Board of Trustees acted to reinstate 15 faculty members, offering them contracts for 1973-74.


May 18 – The Board voted to seek court protection from creditors under Chapter 11 of US Bankruptcy Act after four Iowa banks instigated foreclosure action on a \$556,000 mortgage against the college library.

May 21 - A Bankruptcy Judge issued an order staying the college's secured creditors pending a court hearing.

May 25 – Parsons witnesses presented testimony and documents to support a request for court approval of Chapter 11 bankruptcy.

May 29 – In a 12-page ruling, a judge ordered the college to post a \$250,000 surety bond within 10 days to show evidence that it is prepared to pay past and future installments on its secured debt.

June 1 – The decision of the Board of Trustees to close the college was announced at a meeting of students and faculty.

SPOTLIGHTING - THE YEAR 1973 ...

It's been 40 long years since we lost our Parsons College. In Fairfield, that was "THE NEWS." The month was June, the year was 1973. Here are some of the other noteworthy, and some of the UN-noteworthy happenings around the country and the world during that tumultuous year:

The Watergate investigation and scandal was in full swing. President Nixon was quoted as saying, "People must know whether or not their president is a crook. Well, I'm not a crook," he said.... Premier George Papadopoulos arrived and abolished Monarchy in Greece. He established a Parliamentary Presidential Republic and promptly named himself as its first president. He was ousted shortly thereafter... As the doors of Parsons were closing on June 1, the Fairfield Ledger saluted 15 students and two faculty members who were initiated into Phi Kappa Phi, a national honorary society, for scholastic excellence. How ironic was that?... The Des Moines Register reported, "State legislators expressed regret at Parsons closing, but leaders of both political parties said there was very little the state could have done to assist the private school to remain open. 'We've done our share with tuition grants,'" one leader said. No special favors were granted by the local pundits either. ...

After years on the air, "Rowan & Martin's Laugh-in" was cancelled by NBC-TV. ... The U.S. launched "Skylab", the first-ever space station. ... The top 4 TV shows you were watching were, All In The Family, Walton's, Sanford & Son and M*A*S*H. ... Elvis and Priscilla Presley divorced after a 6-year marriage. ...

The U.S. agrees to a cease fire in Vietnam, thus paving the way for U.S. troops to finally come home. ... Japan allows its' citizens to own gold. ... George Steinbrenner bought the New York Yankees from CBS for 12M. ... The Eisenhower Tunnel, the highest and longest in the U.S., is opened in Colorado. ... Secretariat won the Triple Crown of horse racing. ... The Bahamas declared independence from the United Kingdom. ... A 15-yearold girl set a record by limbo-ing under a flaming bar at 6 1/2 inches. ... J. Paul Getty III is kidnapped and released months later. ... The Everly Brothers (Phil & Don) broke-up. ... An Ozark airplane was knocked out of the sky by lightning and 36 people died. ... Kansas City's George Brett got his first major league base hit. University of Texas (Arlington) was the first accredited school in the U.S. to offer belly dancing. ...

UCLA won its' 7th straight NCAA basketball championship. ... "The Young and Restless" premiered. ... Super Bowl adds cost \$88,000 a minute, and the Miami Dolphins beat Washington, 14-7. ... The first portable cell phone call was made in New York City. ... "Bonanza" aired its' 440th, and final, show on television. ... Pioneer10 reached Jupiter. ... Henry Kissenger was sworn in and became the U.S.'s first Jewish Secretary of State. ... Montreal defeated the Chicago Blackhawks to win the Stanley Cup and the Oakland A's won the World Series over the New York Mets. ... Former Illinois Governor Otto Kerner was convicted for his role in an illegal racetrack scheme (some things never change, Illinois is still going strong on convictions). ... (Continued on page 5)

Major League baseball adopted the Designated Hitter rule in the American League. ... "The Godfather" won the Oscar for Best Movie but Marlon Brando refused to accept the award for Best Actor due to the treatment of American Indians. ... Other favorite movies you may have been watching were "The Sting" - "Exorcist" -"American Graffiti". ... The Concorde Jet flew from Washington to Paris in 3 hours and 33 minutes. ... Juan Peron was elected president of Argentina. ...U.S. psychiatrists said homosexuals are not mentally ill. ... Gordon Johncock and team won the Indy 500 race and carried off \$232,022 first place money. ... Arab terrorists shot a number of passengers on a Boeing 737 flight heading to Kuwait. ... Billy Jean King defeated Bobby Riggs in a "Battle of the Sexes" tennis match. ... Arguably the Best Song of the Year was "First Time Ever I Saw Your Face" by Roberta Flack. ... Median Household Income was \$10,512 - unemployment was 4.9% - and a first class stamp was .08 cents. ... In addition to Parsons College, we also watched the passing of Betty Grable, Lyndon B. Johnson and Pablo Picasso. ... And that's the way it was 40 years ago in 1973....

Parsons Loses an old friend: Frosty Westering, NCAA HOF Coach Who Groomed Teams & Men

Forrest "Frosty" Westering was a class act! If you played football for Frosty, you were a lucky guy. Frosty passed away April, 15, 2013 in Tacoma, WA. He was 85 and spent the last two months of his life in hospice care.

Frosty's coaching career started inauspiciously at Fairfield High School in 1956. He moved across town to Parsons College and became Athletics Director and shortly after, also took over briefly as head football coach and flashed an inaugural season record of 9-0 and won the Iowa Conference title.

One of Frosty's special moments as AD was the 1961, signing of an agreement to take his Wildcats football team to play Northeast Missouri (Kirksville) in the Mineral Water Bowl in Excelsior Springs, MO. Although they lost the game, it was a major break-through for the college's athletics program.

But, truth be told, his happiest moments were always the ones he spent with his players, and teams, on a day-to-day basis. Frosty became a champion at building both, nationally recognized football teams, and preparing well-rounded young men with character to take on life after college.

Dick Barton. '66, one of Frosty's former boys from Parsons, told E-News, "Frosty was a coach like no other coach I've ever seen. He took pride in developing young people as much as winning football games. He provided the opportunity for us to succeed as individuals and as a team. It was more than football, we were family. Frosty was like a father to us. If you needed to borrow a car, he was there, no questions asked. You were invited to his house for dinner, you knew his family. He treated us like family. We were his family – what a terrific man!"

The expansion of Parsons and the satellite program led Frosty to Albert Lea College in 1966. Over the next six years he ran up a 27-22-2 mark. But with the demise of Parsons, and related schools, Frosty was lured to the west coast in 1972. He took over as head coach of the Pacific Lutheran Lutes and found "a home of homes."

Needless to say, Frosty took the bull by the horns as well as the Northwest Conference (NAIA). From 1972 to 1997 (26 years) his teams racked a 213-55-5 mark, finished first in the conference 11 times, went to the NAIA championship game seven times, and won the NAIA Championship three times. In 1998, his Lutes moved up the NCAA Division-III and he added another 49 wins (49-15), two first places, and one Division-III Championship.

Of Frosty's 32 teams, only three finished lower than 2nd, none lower than 3rd. He never had a losing season. We find this incredible. So did the NCAA officials. Frosty was named 'National Coach of the Year' three times. His 303-96-7 career record, ranks 9th among ALL college football coaches and earned his induction to the NCAA College Football Hall of Fame in 2005, three years after his last season. Three of Frosty's former Parsons players – **Dick Barton, Bill Larkin and Gary Myers** – attended the ceremony in South Bend, IN.

He was well known for his motivational speaking and his efforts to spread his positive outlook on life. He leaves a legacy far greater than his wins and losses and also leaves his son Scott, as head coach at Pacific Lutheran. Frosty was also a successful author, writing two books ("Make The Big Time Where You Are" and "The Strange Secret of the Big Time: What Makes Life Great") and transferring his beliefs about coaching into life skills.

Frosty is survived by his wife, Donna, five children and 13 grandchildren...


